Placement in Curriculum: Required Course for International Health Concentration of the Master's in Health Science

Course Description: Course examines the inner working of international health organizations. The course primarily is concerned with organizations focused on health prevention and promotion, disease remediation, and epidemiology. Students will explore the goals and mechanisms of these international health organizations and understand their mission, roles, procedures, funding sources, and evaluation or effectiveness within the global community.

Course Objectives: Upon completion, students will be able to:

- Identify and have knowledge of the structure of the leading international health organizations
- Understand the roles and functions of major organizations working in international health
- Compare and contrast the functions and roles of the major international health organizations
- Categorize the mission and methods of major organizations involved in international health issues.
- Identify the funding sources and the scope of action of the major international health organizations and the allocations of resources.

Rationale: This knowledge is central to those enrolled in the International health concentration; this will be also an elective course for the International health certificate.

Teaching Strategies: Lecture/discussion, Readings, Guest lecturers, Audio/visual aids, Assessments of Journal Articles, Class Discussions, Team Building/Group Learning.

Required Textbooks: None required; selective readings and Web research will be assigned.

Additional Materials: PowerPoint presentations, journal articles, and student assessments will be placed on Blackboard for downloading by students.
